27th, 1870

Oct^r 2nd., 1837.

A Meeting was held this morning at which all Masters except Jno. Hainsworth attended.

Resolved 1st. That George Wade, Slubber, John Wade, Willeyer, and two pieceners, a sister and a br^v of the above named Joseph Wade & Sarah Wade, be pensioned off from their employ at this place. The above resolution was passed in writing because of the two pieceners being caught carrying away from the Mill two pieces of board worth about 10/-.

2nd. That Chas. Smith, Joseph Ross and James Sutcliffe be the Tenterers during the winter ensuing, to commence this day. Having difficulty in connection about Coal leading, when it was suggested that in future they should be lead by the following parties in the following proportions - Daniel Hainsworth 6 tun, John Hainsworth 4 tun, and John & George Hainsworth 3 tun.

3rd. That if be any pieces be dried in the Tenterhouse, by the heat of the flues, such pieces shall be charged the full price.

4th. That the Old Scribbler No. 9 be carried to the New Scribbler fetched from John Hodgson of Cleckheaton on Wednesday next.

5th. That John Hainsworth Sen^r and William Robert Overton attend the sales at Gildersome on Wednesday next to buy such things as they may deem requisite for the Mills, their expenses to be paid by the Firm.

Oct^r 9th., 1837.

A meeting was held this morning at which all the Masters attended.

Resolved 1st. That no Porter be purchased this season, for the use of this Company.

2nd. That the coals be led from Byerley Colliery in the following proportions, by the following parties, viz., Daniel Hainsworth 6/13, John Hainsworth Sen^r 4/13, and John & Geo. Hainsworth 3/13, the Coal books to be examined every 4 weeks by the Masters at the Monday morning meeting.

3rd. That all the Masters pieces scribbled here shall be dried in the Tenterhouse during the Winter Season, say from this date to March 1838.

Oct^r 16th., 1837.

A meeting was held this morning at which all the Masters attended except Jno. Hainsworth Jun^r

Res^d That all the old wood be sold to the highest bidder.

Oct^r 23, 1837.

A Meeting was held this morning when Peter Hainsworth, John Hainsworth Jun., Geo. Hainsworth attended.

Res^d 1. That John Bannister stop at this place till six o'clock every morning.

Nov^r 20th, 1837.

A meeting was held this morning when it was resolved:-

1st. That Smith Balmforth & Co. make a new Press for Cloth Mills, the dimensions as follows - height within 2ft.5in., width 1ft.11in. and depth 1 foot. Jer^v Booth agreed for the above at eight pounds. The whole to be complete and fitted up with a good sound oakplank over the old pan in the Cloth Mill within two weeks.

Dec^r 4th/37.

A meeting was held this morning when it was resolved:-
1st. That a Door be made for the Coal Hole in the Tenterhouse.

2nd. That no person shall be allowed to wash himself in the Cloth Mill excepting the Cloth Millers & Engine Tender & Overlooker.

Dec^r 11th.

A meeting was held this morning when it was resolved:-
1st. That the Engine run, & Cloth Millers work, thro' every night, until Saturday evening & the same next week.

Dec^r 18, 1837.

A Meeting was held this Morning when All the masters was present.

It was resolved 1st. That the Window Hole in the Corner of Cloth Mill Be Broken out By Joseph Robarts and the Window put in.

Jan^y 1, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning when all the Masters was present.

It was resolved that all the Slubbers Clean their own Windows at least Once aweek or forfeit Sixpence for each offence.
Jany. 8, 1838.

A Meeting was held this morning when all the Masters was Present.

1st. It was Resolved that Busfield & Thompson be the Cloth Millers at Upper Mill, Stanningley, Busfield to be the weigher of Soap and Finisher of Cloth.

Engaged James Waid from Holbeck as Engine Tender at 21/Od. per week, for 13 Hours per day work for a full day, and 3/0 per night for running through, some Allowance for Cleaning out the Boiler, but nothing for Packing &c.,&c.

The Policies of Insurance for the Upper Mill, Stanningley, to be called for at Mr. John Varleys by Mr. John Hainsworth Sen^r, & P^r Hainsworth to take them to the Insurance Offices in order to get them transferred to P. Hainsworth stata quo.

The firm of the Upper Mill, Stanningley, to be P^r Hainsworth, the Drawback on Soap to be claimed accordingly.

15 Jan^y 1838.

A meeting was held this morning, when all the masters except Dan^r was present.

Resolved 1st. That no servants whatever be employed from one Mill to Another, viz., Cape Mill & Stanningley Upper Mill, Except a Written Notice from the Overlooker that he agrees to let them go.

2nd. That no Smoking be allowed on any acc^t in the Cloth Mill, any servant found smoking to forfeit his employment. This resolution applies to Millwrights employed by this Firm.

3rd. That J. Thompson of Upper Mill, Stanningley, be the weigher of Soap & finisher of Cloth, & to have the privilege of employing a partner in the Milling department sh^d Jos. Busfield leave his employ as we expect.

MEMO - Jany. 23/38 of a Meeting held this morning, present Jno. Hainsworth Senr., Geo. Hainsworth, Peter Hainsworth & Dan^r Hainsworth.

1st. Res^d:- That this Meeting highly disapproves of the conduct of Wm. Fox in taking away from his work this morning without acquainting some of the Masters.

2nd. That should Wm. Fox return to his work Jno. Clough and him shall seek wash alternate weeks.

3rd. That should the Masters witness the same shameful neglect in collecting the skip as they have done, they will feel compelled to resort to ulterior measures in order to remedy the evil.

4th. That any wash soaker neglecting to bring a skip when in his way, he be informed that he has rendered himself liable to be turn from this place.

5th. That one of the Tents go home and his side next the Beck in the Tenterhouse be reserved for the Masters during the remainder of the season for Drying Wool, the side specified to be exclusively under the control of Wm. Roberts.

FARSLEY Feby. 5th, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning when all the Masters attended.

Resolved 1st. That as it is reported to us by Tho^f Barrand and Allott of Pudsey, that a Key for the Lock of Leadhouse low Door, went to mend to the S^r Allott of Pudsey about two years ago, and whereas the said Key has not been returned, we do determine that Tho^f Barrand shall procure the S^r Key without delay and deliver the same to our Overlooker this week or forfeit his employment.

2nd. That as Robt. Brook broke one of the shafts of a Carrying Cart by his own negligence, we deem him to pay 2/9d. on Saturday evening next, been considered the half of the damage.

3rd. That the Millers shall always obey the orders of Wm. Roberts, Overlooker, respecting the Drying of Flocks. When orders are given for the Flocks removing out of the Kiln, the S^r Millers shall do so without delay, and if they refuse or neglect to do so, for 10 minutes after the order is given, they shall be deprived of the privilege of drying in future.

Feby. 12, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which a majority of Masters attended, when the following resolutions were unanimously adopted.

1st. That any Clothmiller or Workman at this Mill leaving his work to resort to the public House, or known to be clubbing for Ale during working hours, shall immediately leave his employ.

2nd. That Joseph Pickels come to repair the stocks on tuesday morning 13th inst., viz., No. 8 - 9 - 10 - 12 & 13.

3. That all keys belonging to the Dyehouse and dry-house doors to be delivered to Wm. Roberts after been opened in the morning.

Feb'y 13th, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning, when all the Masters attended, in time.

It was resolved:-

1st. That the Millers pay two shillings for firing the Kiln, to dry Flocks, instead of four shillings as was previously agreed on, and it is further determined that the Millers shall never fire the Kiln for drying Flocks on any account.

2nd. That the Masters Private Books be presented next Monday morning and the Soap a/c to be rectified and the Coal books to be compared.

Feb'y. 13, 1838.

It was unanimously agreed that the Carriers shall not wait for any pieces, that are not ready when they are going to Gomersall, and they shall always start from Home early in the morning, to be at Gomersall if possible by 10 o'clock in the morning.

It was also agreed that Daniel & George endeavour to buy a Horse for the use of the Mill. The old Horse generally known by the name of Chinlegs was sold by ticket to Mr. Daniel for thirty shillings.

Feb'y. 26, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which all the Masters attended, when it was Resolved:-

1st. That John Hainsworth buy a pound of quicksilver.

2nd. That the Carriers shall not leave a barrel of wash unpoured out, unless there is no room in the cisterns.

3rd. That the Carriers shall only have 10 stone of Bran instead of 15 stone for three weeks corn for each Horse, and the reduction of Bran shall be made up with choppy, and it is further determined that every Carrier shall invariably give their respective Horses choppy with the corn, and should any neglect to do so, to forfeit 6d. each time. James Hainsworth to be the Inspector and for his trouble to have one half of the fine.

4th. That no master shall send a Carrier to Gomersall with fewer than 20 PFF together, but shall convey his own when under the above quantity, and charge 2d. per piece.

And it also agreed that no Master shall convey his goods to Gomersall when above 20 pieces without consulting & agreeing with all the other Masters.

The above resolution to apply respecting carriage to Leeds in all its bearings except on Market days.

5th. That Dan's young horse be kept at the Mills @ 1/0 per day from Monday 19th Feb'y.

A meeting was held this morning, March 5, 1838, when Jno. Hainsworth Senr., Geo. Hainsworth & Danl. Hainsworth was present.

Res^d 1st. That this Meeting is at a loss for words fully to express the extent of their disapprobation at the conduct of some Masters for so often absenting themselves from this honourable meeting.

2nd. That we gents now go home.

April 2nd, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which all the Masters attended excepting Daniel Hainsworth.

Resolved 1st. That the Millers shall have two pound of Soda allowed for each piece, this being $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. less than usual on acct of having many light coloured Hersey Pieces.

2nd. That the Pool piece Beck above the bridge shall be straightened and banked up on each side by the Carriers under the superintendence of Wm. Roberts.

3rd. That the Middle Horse Stand be widened.

April 16th, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which all the Masters attended except D. Hainsworth.

Resolved 1st. That no milled Soap'd Cloth shall be left piled one upon another during the night from 8 to 6, any Miller or Millers violating this rule shall leave our Employ without further notice.
2nd. That as Wm. Emsley's Son has lately taken away from his work and absented himself a whole week, it is hereby determined that if the said Son of Wm. Emsley be proved guilty of misdemeanour in the future he shall forthwith leave our employ.
3rd. That John Hainsworth Senr. & John Hainsworth Junr. buy a Press without delay for packing Clo. in bales.

April 23rd., 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which John Hainsworth Jr., George Hainsworth, Danl. Hainsworth and Pr. Hainsworth attended.

Opposing New Road.

Resolved 1st. That ten pound be given to the opposition of the new Road from Pudsey to Leeds.

April 30, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which John Hainsworth Sen. & George Hainsworth & John Hainsworth Junr. and Peter Hainsworth was Present.

May 21, 1838.

A meeting was held this morning at which Jno. Hainsworth Junr., Jno. Hainsworth Senr., Peter Hainsworth, Danl. Hainsworth & Geo. Hainsworth attended.

Lambert Slobing.

Kitchen Petler.

Resolved 1st. That Nat Lambert have the vacant Billey upon condition that he be transferred from the fine to the course End and that Wm. Cook be taken to the fine End.
2nd. That Thom^s Kitchen be promoted from Willower to Petler and that his Wage be advanced 2/- per week, viz., from ten shillings to twelve shillings per week.
4th. That Joseph Wood be employed as Willower at 10/- per week.
5th. That any Master ordering pans and being dis-appointed of them by customers shall have the very first at liberty on the succeeding day, all the rest of the Masters falling back to give place for him. But should the said Master neglect to occupy the pan or pans on the specified day, he shall forfeit the pan or pans, and for each pan or pans thus unoccupied he shall in addition forfeit 1/- for Each pan - and all Masters shall be bound to dye in the pans ordered whenever they are at liberty, or to forfeit the sum for each pan stated above.

A meeting was held this morning when all the Masters attended except J. Hainsworth Junr.

Mr. Law who had been sent for to look at the Cards nailed on the back Doffer of the Machine Scribbler No. 11, agreed that as the Cards were deficient, he would replace them with New Cards for nothing, if those that are nailed do not work three or four years, but if they should prove better than is expected and work decently for 4 years, then the said Cards shall be charged to the account of Messrs. Hainsworths one half of the original price.

Resolved 1st. That Benjⁿ Bury, George Cates, Wm. Hainsworth & Another, be the Tenterers during the next season, never to be fewer than 4 Tenterers.

4th. That Charles Rhodes paint the whole of the Windows, Doors, Spouts, Conductors &c., &c., on these premises for the Sum of Nine Pounds.

5th. That the Greys be packed on Wednesday to commence at 1 o'clock P.M.

And they think the other Masters pay very little regard for the Company Concern or they would have attended this morning, knowing that there was much Business to Decide such as Setting a Slubber on, All knowing a Billy was standing, letting Manure by ticket, and more particularly the decision of the Jurors respecting the Boy that was killed by falling off the out steps at the end of the Mill.

P^r Hainsworth attended about $\frac{1}{2}$ to 9 o'clock, and felt sorry that every Master was absent from the Meeting. He entirely concurs in the above statements, and wishes to record his unqualified abhorrence of such conduct.

John Hainsworth & Co. engage on their part to fix the main pipe of One Inch & three quarters bore to their gas works and carry the same to the extent of their premises on the Farsley side of the Beck at their own cost. And the said Hainsworth, Johnson & Co. hereby engage to continue the said main pipe of One Inch & three quarters bore from the point stated to the place where it may be required. And to find all other pipes, Meter Burners &c. requisite for effectually lighting the aforesaid Mill & out buildings at their own Cost.

John Hainsworth & Co. also engage to supply the requisite quantity of coal gas to light the aforesaid Mill & out buildings for Hainsworth, Johnson & Co. until the 1st of May 1851 on the following terms, that is to say, the price of Coal Gas by Meter at Six Shillings & Eightpence per thousand Cubic feet subject to the following Scale of Discount on a half yearly consumption.

Should however the Leeds Old Gass Co. reduce their charge the reduced price shall be added to the price of the Bradford Gass Co. for the time being, and the average shall be taken of both to determine the charge to Hainsworth, Johnson & Co. RULES FOR THE TURNS OF LOTS & CO.

All Wool dyed at Home to take its turn for Milling,
from the day the Lot is completed Dyeing. But should
two or more Lots be finished dyeing on the same day,
belonging to different persons, he that ordered Pans
first to have first turn.

All Blues or any other colour completed Dyeing from
Home shall take their turn according as they are
delivered entire at the Mill, and shall be put to work
before any dyed at Home on the same day.

Any Master or Customer having two or more Lots at
Mill, he shall be allowed to put one of his after Lots
on, in the room of the first, or should he have
several small Lots, all entitled to their turn, he
may put one large Lot on instead of them, all provided
it does not exceed in quantity to the aforesaid small
Lots.

But no Larger quantity shall ever be permitted to
take the turn of a Lesser without the consent of the
other Master or Customer, whose turn it is to follow
the said Lesser quantity. And any Lot or Lots so put
back shall take the turn of the Lot or Lots put forward.

Provided also, should any Master or Customer have a
Large Lot and a number of Small Lots, he may put the
small Lots on in the place of the large Lot, if they
do not exceed in quantity to the aforesaid large Lot
entitled to the turn. And the Large Lot so put back
shall take the turn to which the small Lot dyed last
was entitled.

But no succeeding Lot or Lots shall be suffered to
take the turn of any Lot which has previously been put
back for the owner's accommodation.

These Rules apply to both Mills, which are considered
as if one mill only.

The Stone not having been properly adjusted when the Horses started, the Hurry was pulled from under the Stone, and the Stone being attached to the Gin, the Gin pole twisted round and round and, one end coming into contact with the Stone, the end was broken off and struck Willm. Kirk's Horse on his hinder parts.

Willm. Kirk states that Wilfred Vickers ordered him to fetch John Oddy, Horse Doctor, to examine the wound. John Oddy came before 8 o'clock and ordered the wound to be fomented all the night. The Horse becoming worse and worse, Oddy was fetched again, and came about 2 o'clock next morning, when he said the Horse would die.

The Horse died about 8 o'clock on the morning of the 6th Inst.

2nd. - That all coloured cloths be the following price milling except what is called pants that remains as usual, viz., all that takes up to 16 hours milling to be 7/2 per piece for the masters with 10 per cent allowed and that the millers' wage be 1/6 per piece paid from the owners of the cloth.

But any that takes more than 16 hours and up to 28 hours, then the price for the masters to be 7/8 per piece and the millers' wage 1/10 per piece. And any above 28 hours and up to 40 hours, then the price for the masters to be 8/2 per piece and the millers' wage 2/2 per piece.

And should any take above 40 hours milling, then the price for the masters to be 8/8 per piece and the millers' wage 2/6 per piece.

Also for Tentering - Agreed that we charge for pieces that is no longer than the tenters, viz., 41 1/2 yds for customers that do not scribble with us, 1/2 per piece, but for all that is above 1/4 as usual. No alteration with scribbling customers for Tentering.
